### **Emergency Management**

**There is a phrase amongst emergency managers:** It's not a matter of if, but When a disaster happens ...are you prepared?



May 26, 2014 Tornado

Disasters are unexpected; they overwhelm first responders; and lives, health and the environment are often endangered. Our last tornado was July 10, 2018 – 12:30 a.m..



#### North Dakota Century Code

State and Federal law requires each county to set up an Emergency Management organization that will best serve the entire jurisdiction. (NDCC 37-17.1-07; Federal Civil Defense Act of 1950).

## **The Role of Elected Officials**

- Reference management, from mitigation through long-term recovery, should be recognized and supported by all elected officials as a critical government service.
- Understand their emergency authorities and responsibilities, and practice them in conjunction with emergency management officials before a disaster occurs.
- Are required under Federal law to take training relevant to their position in their jurisdictions.

### The Role of Elected Officials Continued

- They should meet with their emergency management officials and establish solid relationships, request a briefing on state and local preparedness efforts, learn about emergency plans and procedures, and visit the emergency operations center and other critical facilities.
- Relected officials must have a clear understanding of how government responds to emergencies and disasters, what resources are available, what types of assistance can be provided to citizens, and how much time it may take to deliver that assistance.

## The Role of Elected Officials Continued

- R They must be able to instill a sense of calm in disaster victims and the public, and temper expectations of what government can do to aid in the recovery. A coordinated message between elected officials and emergency management is necessary so people do not receive conflicting information.
- Real Elected officials play a crucial role in public safety. Their understanding and support of emergency management is vital to the safety and well-being of the public and communities.

### **Emergency Manager Responsibilities**



#### Why is Emergency Preparedness Important?

There are real benefits to being prepared . Being prepared can reduce fear, anxiety, and losses that accompany disasters.Communities, families, and individuals should know what to do in the event of a fire and where to seek shelter during a tornado.They should be ready to evacuate their homes and take refuge in public shelters and know how care for their basic medical needs thereby reducing the demand on public safety resources that are strained or overwhelmed during an emergency.

## **Core Capabilities**





Emergency Management is on the frontlines of developing disaster plans; coordinating training, drills and exercises; and educating the public about disasters. Because disasters are not a daily or even a monthly occurrence, they often go unnoticed--that is, until something happens.



The essential element in development of an emergency management program at the local level is the support of the elected officials. Although elected officials are not involved with the dayto-day activities of the program, it is only with elected officials direction and support that the program can be effective.



Emergency management programs are built on relationships. Most emergency management programs are small and have limited budgets. Emergency managers brings a wealth of experience to the table, along with a broad network of contacts. They also have the ability to bring together a broad and diverse group of people to focus on the emergency. Starts Local & Ends Local

All disasters start local and end local. Most times with the help of other nearby counties, we can contain a minor disaster without State and Federal Assistance. Such as the tornado McKenzie County had this past July.


When a disaster strikes and your local resources are exhausted, then you ask for a declaration from the State. The State then brings in the resources they have to offer. The state has a large inventory of resources from which they can assist a County in its time of need.

#### $Local \rightarrow State \rightarrow Federal$

If the State has exhausted all of its resources, then the Governor will ask for a Presidential Disaster Declaration. Then FEMA will assist the local jurisdiction. North Dakota has had numerous Presidential Disasters. North Dakota is 2<sup>nd</sup> highest in the Country for Presidential Disaster Declarations.

### North Dakota Disaster & Emergency Services (NDDES)

NDDES responsibilities during emergencies and disasters, as mandated by North Dakota State law, are to help protect County residents by coordinating with local response to major emergencies and disasters, directing assistance when needed, and coordinating assistance with the local jurisdiction.
